Research Papers

1. **“Escape from Democracy: How Workplace Democracy Influences Workers’ Democratic Attitudes”** (*Working Paper*)
This paper examines how workplace democracy - i.e., practices that ensure employees voice their opinions and minimize arbitrary domination relying on power imbalance - influences workers’ attitudes toward democracy at a national level. Firstly, by drawing on a survey of American workers, the paper identifies that laborers who get ample opportunities of voicing in their workplace are prone to trust in democratic rules via their enhanced internal and external efficacy. Secondly, this paper finds those who encounter rigid, suppressive, and uncomfortable working conditions are more likely to justify them to reduce cognitive dissonance, thereby displaying more anti-democratic (authoritarian) attitudes, such as intolerance to opposing views or disregard for democratic norms.
2. **“How People Perceive and Define Fairness: Evidence from Survey Experiments”** (*Working Paper*)
The goal of this paper is to uncover the underpinnings of the heterogeneity in fairness-perception among people. This study postulates that two emotions (anger and anxiety) have distinctive effects on how people perceive fairness, and which components they regard significant in defining fairness. By designing a series of experiments that manipulate levels of both anger and anxiety, and using conjoint experimental analysis, this paper examines how emotions regulate the relative importance of equal opportunity, procedural justice, or equal rewards in recognizing fairness. This paper also explores how those differences are connected with attitudes toward minority groups.

3. **“Understanding Others: How experiencing Discrimination Expands Empathy”** (*Master’s Thesis*)
 This paper examines under what condition citizens’ empathetic concern (or perspective-taking) about overall minority groups could be enhanced. This study designs and conducts a survey experiment that assigned one group of respondents to recall their own experience of discrimination. This study finds that a series of procedures of 1) looking back on one’s personally experienced discrimination and 2) considering specific emotions and circumstances of those who had similar experiences raised the levels of empathy for general social minorities. This study also demonstrate that this expanded empathy may serve as leverage to support policies favoring one of the representative minority groups in S. Korea: irregular workers.

4. **“The Big 5 Personality Traits and The Symbolic Ideology of American Voters”** *Presented at MPSA 2019 annual conference.*
 This paper examines how the Big Five personality traits explain the differences between individuals’ “operational ideology” (based on their policy preferences) and their own self-reported “symbolic ideology.” Using ANES 2016 Time Series Study data, the study finds that three traits, Openness to Experiences, Conscientiousness, and Extroversion, explain them: 1) Voters high on Openness tend to report their ideological positions consistent with overall policy preferences constructed by their enhanced political sophistication. 2) Those high on Extroversion are likely to avouch their own ideological position more assertively, even though it is discrepant with their operational ideology.
